

HOW IT ALL BEGAN

AN INTERVIEW WITH ONE OF EARTH RANGERS' FIRST EMPLOYEES

Christopher Hakes serves as the Anthesis Group's associate director for European, Middle Eastern, and African carbon markets. He provides sustainable solutions and enables clean energy transitions for some of the largest and most impactful companies in the world.

But long before he became a sustainability expert on the global stage, Chris graced a much smaller stage: the Kortright Centre's auditorium, where he helped to deliver Earth Rangers' very first assembly.

We chatted with Chris about the earliest days of Earth Rangers, looking back at how it all began! The conversation has been edited for length and clarity.



On my first day at Earth Rangers, I was nervous. I knew Peter Kendall a little bit, but I'd only met Robert Schad once, and I was very intimidated. I was, however, equally excited, and felt like it was the start of something great—which it was.

We were working out of the Schad Foundation offices at Husky Injection Moulding in Bolton, Ontario, and I found it fascinating to be based in this large industrial company.

Do you have a favourite memory or moment from your time at Earth Rangers?

I have two! The first was when we gave our first presentation at the Kortright Centre. My presentation partner, Haviva Porter, and I had so much fun (once we'd gotten over the nerves!) and we were amazed by the response from kids. The second was about two years after I started, we moved into the new Earth Rangers Centre! By this time, we were about 20 staff. With this amazing centre and an ever-improving school program, it felt like a major milestone, and that we had real momentum.



How did Earth Rangers' mission and vision feel to you when you started? Has that feeling changed?

I felt deeply aligned with the mission and vision and still do in my current area working on cutting corporate GHG emissions through nature-based solutions in the carbon markets.

Was there a moment when you realized, "Wow, this is really making an impact?"

After a couple of years of trial and error, we began to return to some of the schools where we'd had our first presentations. Word had obviously gotten around about the presentation (and the animals, of course), and we were greeted like rock stars. Kids were falling over each other after presentations to tell us what they were doing to help the environment. That was very special.

Do you have a favourite Animal Ambassador?

Our first Animal Ambassador was Squeaky, a one-winged redtailed hawk who lived at the Toronto Wildlife Centre. I'll never forget first learning to get him to perch on a leather glove, tie tresses, and feed him mice!

What are you most proud of when you think back on your time at Earth Rangers?

It's the school program that I was most deeply affiliated with. Knowing that continues makes me very happy.

To those just starting out at Earth Rangers: Wear the frog with pride!





For 20 years, Earth Rangers has inspired students to care about biodiversity and protecting nature.

It began with live animal presentations, and our beloved Animal Ambassadors showing off their natural behaviours. These unforgettable encounters got students fired up about conservation—and we've only grown from there.

Our newest assembly brings environmental education to life like never before. With holograms, animatronics, bubbles, wind effects, and more, it's a fully interactive experience designed to surprise, delight, and spark curiosity. Students walk away inspired—and with memories that last a lifetime.



2004

Earth Rangers is founded by Robert Schad and Peter Kendall. We move into our headquarters at the Earth Rangers Centre, located at the Kortright Centre for Conservation.





2005

We give our first live presentation led by presenters Christopher Hakes and Haviva Porter, featuring Animal Ambassadors and multimedia storytelling-much to the delight of the kids in attendance.



2009

The school program expands outside of the GTA to reach communities across Ontario.

We launch Bring Back the Wild-our first fundraising program for kids alongside our partnership with NCC to support four species each year.



2024 SCHOOL TOUR

In 2024, we reached over 275,000 students in 891 schools across Canada from Bonne Bay, Newfoundland to Campbell River, BC, and dozens of communities in between. We also piloted our program in 60 schools across Michigan and Wisconsin, kicking off an exciting expansion into the U.S.!

Here's just a taste of what students experienced:

- Animal Ambassadors like Sonic the Barn Owl and Shelly the Midland Painted Turtle showing off their incredible adaptations
- ECO—our holographic Earth Rangers Communications Operative—sharing her 740 petabytes of wildlife knowledge
- Whales, birds, and fish soaring and swimming through the air above students' heads
- Interactive games and trivia that got students cheering and thinking
- A captivating mystery led by podcast host Earth Ranger Emma, packed with clues and surprises for students to solve



FROM STUDENT TO SCIENTIST

Growing up in Québec, Emmanuelle Gouin was captivated when Earth Rangers visited her school. She experienced one of our very first Éco Héros assemblies—and that moment sparked a lifelong passion for protecting wildlife.

Today, Emmanuelle is pursuing a master's degree in environmental science at the Université du Québec à Rimouski, where she's researching the effects of Arctic warming on the snow bunting—a small bird that plays a critical role in the fragile balance of Northern ecosystems.

Now it's Emmanuelle's turn to inspire the conservationists of tomorrow! This fall, Earth Rangers is proudly supporting Emmanuelle's research through our Wildlife Adoptions Program—and she'll be sharing her knowledge and passion with the next generation of Éco Héros and Earth Rangers with a feature in our School Assembly.

ADDISON TOOK A STAND FOR WILDLIFE!

In 2024, kids across Canada joined our **Take a Stand for Wildlife** campaign, raising funds for conservation. Whether they ran lemonade stands, sold handmade crafts, or whipped up tasty treats for a bake sale, every participating Earth Ranger made a meaningful difference for at-risk species.

Earth Ranger Addison decided to raise \$500 to help swift foxes—a native prairie species once wiped out in Canada but now making a comeback thanks to conservation efforts. Selling homemade cookies and bracelets, Addision more than doubled her goal, raising an impressive \$1,007.75!

"I learned a lot about perseverance. Raising money was hard especially because during the door to door portion of my campaign I got a lot of no's and was originally very discouraged but I stuck with it and am very proud of both myself and my results!"

Today, Phin is thriving as a high school student with an environmentally-inspired courseload, including Recreational Leadership where he's sharing his passion for nature with the next generation. After graduation, Phin wants to become a carpenter-using reclaimed wood and sustainable practices to help make the construction industry more eco-friendly!

Sunita joined Earth Rangers in 2014, at 8 years old. A decade later, she has joined the ER Teens program, and continues to take action for the environment. Sunita produced and screened her documentary. Green Horizons, at the Empowering Youth for **Environmental Action** event. She also raised nearly \$300 for river otters through a Take a Stand for Wildlife fundraiser.

Sunita's and Phin's journeys are just two examples of what it means to be an Earth Ranger. It's more than just a membership card—it's a mindset that kids carry with them their whole lives. 



FROM ECO-ANXIETY TO ECO-ACTION

"Is the planet going to be okay?"

"Why isn't anyone fixing this?"

"What's going to happen to the animals?"

Kids today are more tuned in than ever—and they're asking big, important guestions about the future. But for many educators, knowing how to respond can be tough. How do you ease a student's worry without brushing aside their very real concerns?

That's exactly why we created From Eco-Anxiety to Eco-Action: Strategies to Support Students—a professional development course to help educators guide young people through climate concerns and toward meaningful action.

In 2024, we delivered four sessions of the course, along with a series of seminars and presentations that gave teachers the tools—and the confidence—to turn eco-anxiety into empowerment.

- 1. Engage students directly with hands-on, naturebased programming
- 2. Equip teachers through targeted professional development workshops and ready-to-use resources
- 3. Engage school and district leaders to consider the value of nature learning in achieving broader educational outcomes


