## A LOVE OF ANIMALS RUNS DEEP

### CELEBRATING SUPER RANGER VARIELLE WALLACE



Some children seem to know exactly who they are from the very start. Varielle was one of them. As a toddler just learning to talk, Varielle announced that she was going to be an “animal doctor” — and she never wavered from that path.

Varielle became an Earth Ranger in 2015 at the age of eight. She completed two *Bring Back the Wild* fundraising campaigns, first for the Swift Fox and then for the Peregrine Falcon, proudly wearing her Earth Rangers badge as she went door to door with a donation box she made herself.

She created Christmas cards and filled shoeboxes for children in need through our *Homemade Holiday Mission*, planted seeds along her bike routes, hung “Do Not Litter” posters around her neighborhood, and once carefully returned a fallen baby squirrel to its mother. She even appeared on *Coffee with Clover* on Rogers TV, where she shared why protecting animals mattered so much to her.

Her early dedication earned her Super Ranger status, one of her proudest achievements!

Over the years, Varielle’s love for animals grew into a lifelong commitment to their care. Her home became a haven for rescued animals — goats, opossums, snakes and the occasional bird in need of care.

Horses became her greatest passion, and alongside her beloved Sweet Sophie, she became a back-to-back show jumping champion in 2022 and 2023. She earned her equestrian certifications, coached as a junior instructor and worked as a junior veterinary technician. Varielle graduated high school with honours — earning both the Ontario Scholar Award and the Lieutenant Governor’s Award for Volunteering and Community Involvement. Dedicated to her lifelong goal of helping animals, in the fall of 2025 she began studying Equine Management at the University of Guelph — the first step toward her dream of earning her Doctorate of Veterinary Medicine at the Ontario Veterinary College.

Just months into her studies, Varielle was diagnosed with a rare and aggressive brain tumor. She is meeting this immense challenge with the same courage, grace and remarkable spirit she has carried her entire life.

Varielle represents the very best of what it means to be an Earth Ranger. We are profoundly proud to call her one of our own, and prouder still of the person she is.

**This annual report is dedicated to Varielle — may her strength, compassion and spirit continue to inspire us, always.**

## LETTER FROM THE PRESIDENT



At Earth Rangers, we believe creating a better future for the planet goes hand in hand with helping kids become more optimistic, empowered and resilient themselves – lofty goals to be sure and ones that could never be achieved alone. This year, I have been reminded again and again that partnership is not just part of our work, it is the reason our work is possible.

Every day, Earth Rangers partners with schools to bring environmental education directly to students in a way that is engaging and hopeful. We collaborate with scientists and conservation experts, like the Weston Family Northern Scholars and the Ontario Conservation Accelerator, to ensure our programs are grounded in credible, evidence-based information that's also inspiring. You've already read about [Varielle](#), whose story will leave a lasting impact on me and so many of our team who are lucky to know her. I would also like to introduce you to [Arya](#), an Earth Rangers alumna who is now 16. As a child, she was an active member, even winning a battery recycling contest! Years later, as an ER Teen wanting to give back, she led a wildlife conservation session for her younger brother's class, inspiring them to follow in her footsteps. This is the transformation that is at the heart of Earth Rangers.

In 2025, we continued to expand our reach and deepen our impact through partnerships that strengthened every part of our organization. Our school programs connected with 280,000 students across Canada and the United States. Our digital programs helped over 112,000 kids take meaningful environmental action no matter where they live. Our content and storytelling reached millions of families, introducing new audiences to the Earth Rangers mission.

None of this happens without our partners, so thank you for being part of this work and the Earth Rangers community.

Together, we are building a generation of kids who not only believe they can make a difference, but who already are.

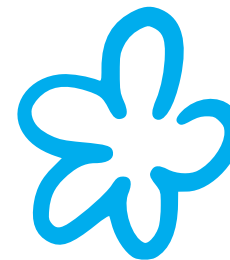
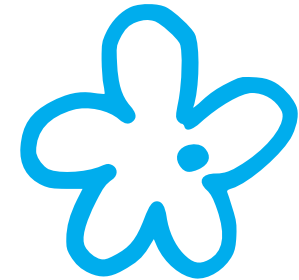

## 2025 AT A GLANCE

Every year, kids demonstrate what's possible when they are empowered to care for the planet. 2025 was no exception – a year defined by big numbers, big impact and big ambitions.



More than **280,000 students in 1,050 schools** experienced the Earth Rangers School Assembly, pushing our all-time reach to **over 3 million** and setting a new single-year delivery record.



Our reach exploded this year with our new *Animal Saving Heroes* YouTube series, which earned **88 million views** and was nominated for a 2026 Kidscreen award for Best Kids' YouTube Channel (spoiler alert – we won!).

And the Earth Rangers Podcast, now in its 11th season, surpassed **10 million lifetime downloads**.



Ending the year with more than **460,000 members** and alumni and an average of 140 new kids joining every day, the Earth Rangers community continued to grow. But what matters most is what kids do after they join.

In 2025 alone, members completed more than **314,000 real-world environmental actions**.



## KING CHARLES III CORONATION MEDAL PROGRAM



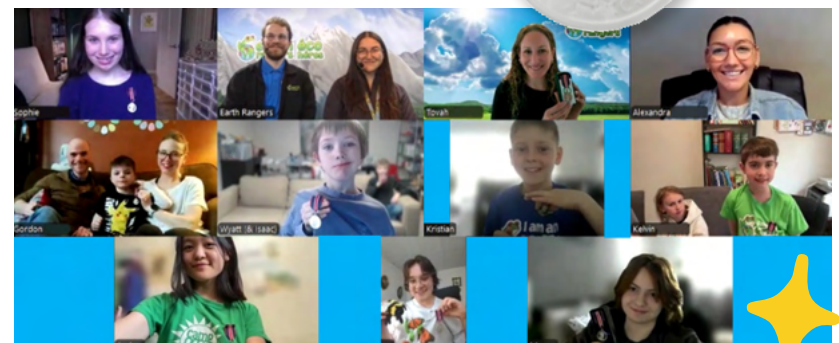
Earth Rangers was honored to participate in the King Charles III Coronation Medal Program, nominating individuals who have made outstanding and lasting contributions to their communities.

The opportunity was particularly meaningful as His Majesty King Charles III has served as Earth Rangers' Patron since 2012. As an official nominating partner, Earth Rangers put forward 153 individuals whose dedication has helped advance our mission and whose actions reflect the spirit of environmental stewardship that His Majesty has long championed.

To celebrate, Earth Rangers held a number of ceremonies to present the medals. We were honored to welcome The Honorable Edith Dumont, Lieutenant Governor of Ontario and the King's representative in the province to our Toronto event. Honorees ranged from inspiring young Earth Rangers, to volunteers, conservation leaders and philanthropists.

**David Palmer:** David is one of our longest-serving Board members and a fundraising powerhouse. David led the University of Toronto's Boundless campaign, the largest fundraising initiative in Canadian history. His fundraising expertise and support over the years have made an enormous impact at Earth Rangers.

**Ranger Grace:** Grace took on a very ambitious litter clean-up and fundraiser for swift fox conservation. She has also completed more than 23 environmental missions.



Earth Rangers also brought together 30 kids who received Coronation Medals in a virtual celebration recognizing their participation and contributions to environmental action.

## PROJECT 2050

2025 marked the successful completion of Project 2050, a five-year initiative supported by the Government of Canada that empowered youth climate action through a series of Challenges. Working with educators, conservation organizations, and partners including: EcoSchools Canada, CultureLink, Jooay, the Centre for Indigenous Environmental Resources, Jour de la Terre, and Mouvement ACTES, Earth Rangers engaged children of all backgrounds, geographies, and abilities in hands-on learning to build sustainable habits. Together, we engaged **over 375,000 kids**, who logged an incredible **1.6 million climate-friendly habits!**

Project 2050 was delivered through ten themed Challenges:

- *Act Like an Animal* explored climate impacts on wildlife and encouraged habits like “Snack like a Rabbit” — having a meatless meal.
- *Earth Defence Squad* turned climate action into “superpowers,” like “Launch the Energy Zapper” to unplug unused electronics.
- *All Taste, No Waste* addressed food waste with habits like “Stop the Fuzz” — freezing leftovers before they spoil.
- *Gross Out* encouraged active transportation through habits like “Sweat It There!” — walking or biking instead of driving.
- The magic-themed *Vanishing Act*, taught waste-reduction with “Watch it Vanish!” — donating items instead of throwing them away.



### PARTNER SPOTLIGHT: CULTURELINK

From 2021 to 2025, CultureLink engaged over 2,500 newcomers to Canada — immigrant and refugee children and families — in Project 2050 and climate action. The Kids Learn to Ride program showed participants how biking instead of driving supports climate action, while offering free bike tune-ups, safety materials and accessories to make cycling more accessible.

## NATURE EDUCATION COLLECTIVE

The Nature Education Collective (NEC) is a collaboration between some of Canada's leading national environmental education organizations — **Earth Rangers, Project Learning Tree Canada, Ducks Unlimited Canada and Canadian Wildlife Federation** — dedicated to expanding access and improving the quality and consistency of nature education across Canada. In 2025, the NEC helped advance the work of Environment and Climate Change Canada on the development of a **National Framework for Environmental Learning**, which was released in December. The NEC partners are also working together to deliver a three-pronged program to build capacity and commitment to environmental literacy in school systems across the country, including teacher training, direct to student delivery and thought leadership.

## VOICES OF THE NORTH

Storytelling is one of our most powerful ways to connect children with the natural world. Earth Rangers released a special season of the Earth Rangers Podcast called *Voices of the North*, highlighting the challenges facing Arctic wildlife and the people working to protect northern ecosystems. This season was developed in collaboration with **Sylvia Cloutier**, an Inuit writer, producer, performing artist and cultural leader.

In *Voices of the North*, Earth Ranger Emma sets out on an 8,000-kilometre journey following migrating geese – only to arrive in the Arctic and confront a surprising question: how can hunting animals be part of protecting them? Guided by her co-host Aputik and the people she meets, Emma begins to understand the deep relationship between Inuit communities, wildlife and the land. From sharing a community feast in Kuujjuaq to travelling by dog sled across the sea ice, each experience reveals a perspective on conservation rooted in respect, balance and lived knowledge. Emma’s journey offers young listeners a rare and meaningful glimpse into northern life, and the importance of listening to and learning from Indigenous perspectives.



Sylvia Cloutier is originally from Kuujjuaq, Nunavik. Through her work in music, film and live performance – including Inuit throat singing and drum dancing – she is dedicated to sharing and strengthening Inuit knowledge and traditions. Her work helps ensure that Inuit stories, perspectives and relationships with the land continue to be shared with new generations.



## PARTNER SPOTLIGHT: WESTON FAMILY FOUNDATION

With support from the Weston Family Foundation, Earth Rangers expanded its work in northern and Indigenous education through two flagship initiatives: *Voices of the North* (previous page) and *Finding the Caribou*. These programs brought stories and learning experiences about Arctic ecosystems and wildlife to kids across Canada.

## FINDING THE CARIBOU

Finding the Caribou is a collaborative classroom experience for Grades 5 and 6 that brings together technology, research and Indigenous knowledge to explore the changes affecting caribou in the Yukon. Developed in partnership with **Esri Canada**, researcher **Karl-Antoine Hogue** and the **Van Tat Gwich'in community** in Old Crow, the program uses mapping tools and field-based scenarios to immerse students in the challenges facing the Porcupine Caribou herd. With a free kit that includes a teacher's guide, journal sheets and caribou tracks, students use ArcGIS mapping software to track caribou movements, learn to interpret data using a two-eyed seeing approach, and learn about the impact of climate change on northern ecosystems. More than 1,500 students participated in 2025.



## COMMUNITY ACTIVATION

Earth Rangers connected face-to-face with communities through public activations, introducing families to how important (and fun!) it is to be an Earth Ranger.

Through our partnership with **The Greenbelt Foundation**, we engaged more than 9,000 children at the **Toronto Zoo** with our interactive *Which Greenbelt Animal Are You?* experience. Using a giant touchscreen, kids answered a series of questions to discover which local species they were most like, then received personalized takeaways with information about the animal, its role in the Greenbelt and how to take action.

Earth Rangers also partnered with **Arcadia Earth**, an immersive environmental experience that explores the planet's challenges through art, technology and storytelling. Our Animal Ambassadors (and their handlers!) attended events like Earth Fest, Family Fun Fest, and March Break Stay & Play, where families engaged in hands-on activities, animal meet-and-greets and conversations about wildlife conservation and sustainable living.

Closer to home, Earth Rangers participated in **Winterfest in Vaughan**, connecting with local families through interactive activities and outreach. These moments help strengthen our presence in the communities where we live and work, while introducing new audiences to our programs in fun and accessible ways.



# SPARKING CURIOSITY

Through interactive school assemblies, we help students connect with wildlife, conservation stories and real-world environmental action.



## WILDLIFE IN JEOPARDY

In 2025 the Earth Rangers School Assembly Program set a new record of **1,050 assemblies** delivered across Canada and the United States – the highest number in our history!

More than **280,000 students** experienced the program this year, bringing our total reach to over **3 million kids** since 2010. This record-breaking year was made possible, in part, by a major step forward in how the assembly is delivered. In 2025, Earth Rangers launched our first ever satellite delivery teams – one in Calgary, Alberta and one in Montreal, Quebec! These regional teams mean we can deliver assemblies more efficiently and consistently across Canada, and we are transforming our ability to respond to demand for the program all year round. The Quebec team also plays a critical role in helping to expand our French-language delivery, contributing to significant growth not just in Quebec, but in Francophone communities throughout Ontario and Atlantic Canada.



This year's program is a fast-paced, highly interactive experience that combines storytelling, science and hands-on learning: the **Wildlife in Jeopardy** game show! Our holographic character ECO serves as gamemaster, dividing the gym into two teams and inviting student volunteers to be contestants on stage. With help from their peers, they answer questions and compete in challenges. Throughout the game, immersive effects like wind, snow, video animations and immersive sound bring the information we teach to life; including Arctic conservation, the interconnectedness of biodiversity and ecosystems and the difference between recycling and "wishcycling".





## PARTNER SPOTLIGHT: CIRCULAR MATERIALS

Extended Producer Responsibility (EPR) is legislation requiring companies to take financial responsibility for “end-of-life” management of the materials they make – such as single-use cups and food packaging. This gives companies more incentive to make less waste, and design products that are more recyclable or more durable. Many provinces in Canada began implementing EPR in 2025, meaning recycling rules have changed! In partnership with Circular Materials, we integrated these new rules into the assembly with a waste-sorting race, designed to teach students (and their households) about the new things that can be recycled, and the importance of ensuring they are clean and dry before they go in the bin!

Teacher feedback reinforces the Earth Ranger’s School Assembly Program’s strong educational value and ability to excite and inspire their students.

## EDUCATOR RESOURCES

**HOMEROOM** New comprehensive lessons and activities continued to be added to our educator portal throughout the year. These included:

**CLASSES** Our new Earth Rangers Classes program gives educators simple, engaging ways to extend environmental learning in the classroom, without adding extra planning time. Classrooms that sign up receive a pennant and pledge sheet to hang on their wall, along with a steady stream of activities, mini-lessons and teacher resources throughout the school year. Content is designed to be flexible and easy to use, whether teachers are looking for a quick activity or something more in-depth. In just four months since launch, 256 Classes have registered, and teachers have consistently shared that the program helps maintain momentum and reinforces key concepts introduced during the assembly.

## MEMBERSHIP AND MISSIONS

Earth Rangers welcomed **51,634 new members** this year. Together, they took on projects big and small in their homes and communities every day. From reducing food waste by mining their fridges and cooking with leftovers, to planting pollinator gardens and creating backyard habitats, to fixing items instead of throwing them away, members got creative while learning about the circular economy. In 2025 alone, members completed **72,360 Missions!**

One of the highlights of the year was the launch of *Ready For Anything*, a new Mission focused on climate change and extreme weather. Through this Mission, kids explore how climate change is affecting the world around them, and why extreme weather like heat waves, floods and wildfires is becoming more common in their communities. Along the way, kids check in on how they're feeling, learning that it's ok to feel worried or uncertain, and that those feelings can be turned into positive action. They then learn practical ways to feel more prepared, including creating a family emergency plan with their caregivers and an emergency kit to keep in their homes — activities designed to foster a sense of agency and safety.

## ER TEENS

As members grow-up, they can now take their journey even further through ER Teens, leading projects in their schools and communities. In 2025, 484 new teens signed up, launching initiatives such as e-waste drives, electric school bus advocacy and local bioblitzes – exploring environmental issues they care about while building confidence and leadership skills.

**Earth Ranger alumni Ayra** brought her passion for conservation into the classroom by leading a wildlife lesson for her younger brother's class. "I wanted to give back and share education," Ayra told us. "It taught me that I can advocate for issues that I think are pressing in the environment right now."

**ER Teen Alexander** helped keep old batteries out of landfills by collecting more than 1,300 used batteries from his community in just a few weeks – an initiative that required planning, outreach, and coordination. "I learned project management skills that allowed me to plan ahead of time and achieve my goal. I was able to make a difference in my community and help the environment."

A highlight in 2025 was a **collaboration with Kids Help Phone's** National Youth Council, where 10 youth co-created three episodes for *The Big Melt* podcast. Created by youth, for youth, the episodes explored topics such as eco-anxiety, misinformation and solutions for the future. "It was a really great opportunity...It was fun to hear my voice and all the other collaborators talk about these subjects that we're all really passionate about," said one participant.

Throughout the year, ER Teens partnered on many events to engage youth, including an advocacy workshop with the Richmond Hill Public Library's Teen Community Leaders, outdoor learning workshops with Outward Bound Canada, presentations for Durham Regional Police Service's Jr. Youth in Policing, habitat restoration with Don't Mess with the Don and a Youth Action for Nature virtual event with Human Nature Projects Canada.



# STORYTELLING THAT INSPIRES

Earth Rangers' digital storytelling grew rapidly in 2025, reaching tens of millions of young people and their families with content designed to do more than just entertain.



Across YouTube, podcasting and web content, our focus remains the same: delivering high-quality, educational storytelling that builds understanding, sparks curiosity and encourages real-world action.



## YOUTUBE

On YouTube, the launch of the Earth Rangers *Animal Saving Heroes* series resulted in exponential channel growth, bringing inspiring wildlife rescues and conservation efforts to a global audience! With content contributed by real-life scientists, conservationists and wildlife experts around the world, each episode features an amazing animal story — from rescuing sea turtles and rehabilitating injured wildlife to tracking endangered species in the wild. Reaching more than **88 million views**, the success of the series demonstrates the enthusiasm for positive, educational and kid-friendly environmental content. The channel also grew to more than 200,000 subscribers and was named **Best Kids' YouTube Channel at the 2026 Kidscreen Awards**. YouTube also brought new audiences — particularly in the United States — into the Earth Rangers ecosystem, directing kid viewers toward deeper engagement through Missions and other programs.

## PARTNER SPOTLIGHT: BUSCH WILDLIFE SANCTUARY

Based in Jupiter, Florida, Busch Wildlife Sanctuary is a nonprofit that has been saving injured, orphaned and sick animals since 1983. In an average year they help thousands of patients rest, recover, and return to the wild where they belong. They also starred in one of Earth Rangers' first *Animal Saving Heroes* videos, featuring Phoebe, a merlin, receiving laser therapy to help heal her fractured wing. The video earned **2,780,269 views** in 2025, and our audience also voted Busch Wildlife Sanctuary as Earth Rangers of the Year!





## EARTH RANGERS PODCAST

The Earth Rangers Podcast continued to engage listeners, with more than **1.5 million downloads** and two new seasons released over the year. In addition to *Voices of the North* which was described earlier in the report, *The Buddy System* season explored cooperation in the animal world, with episodes following partnerships like clownfish and sea anemones, coyotes in prairie ecosystems and pollinators and the plants they depend on – helping kids understand how species rely on one another to survive. Across both seasons, listeners were introduced to real-world science, cultural knowledge and environmental challenges – while reinforcing key ideas about connection, interdependence and our shared responsibility to protect the natural world.

## EARTH RANGERS QUEST

The Earth Rangers Quest is a new way for kids to discover what being an Earth Ranger is all about through an interactive, choose your own adventure experience designed as a first step into the Earth Rangers world. On a journey through different ecosystems, kids complete a series of challenges and make choices on what steps to take. In the end, they are matched with an animal guide that reflects their interests and traits – such as being curious, adventurous or a problem-solver.

### SIERRA: BOBCAT The silent tracker

Sharp-eyed and sure-footed, Sierra is a stealthy mesopredator who helps keep her mountain ecosystem in balance.

One of fewer than 900 of his kind left in the world, Strut carries the legacy of his species' hard-won comeback with every bold, high-flying move.

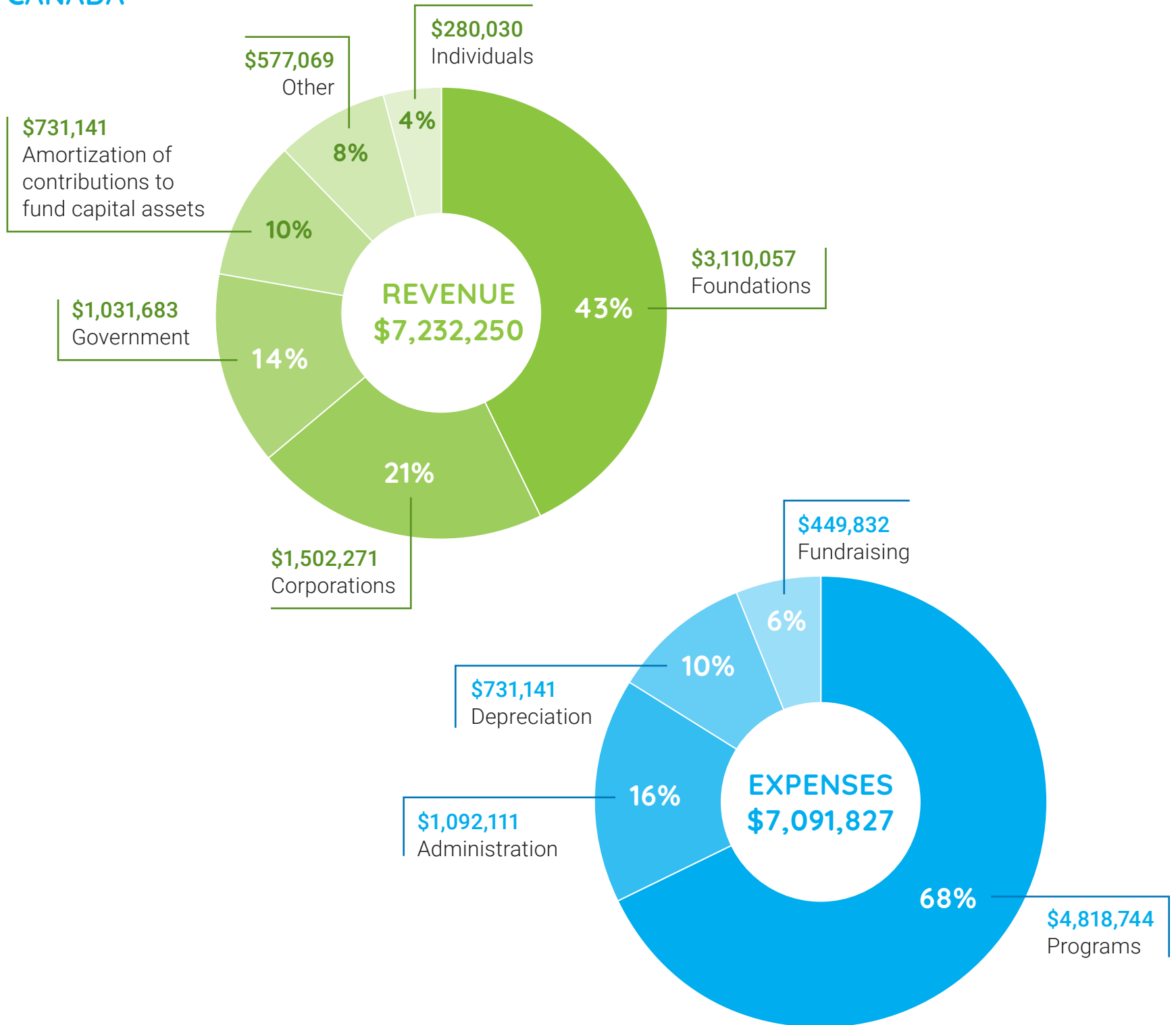

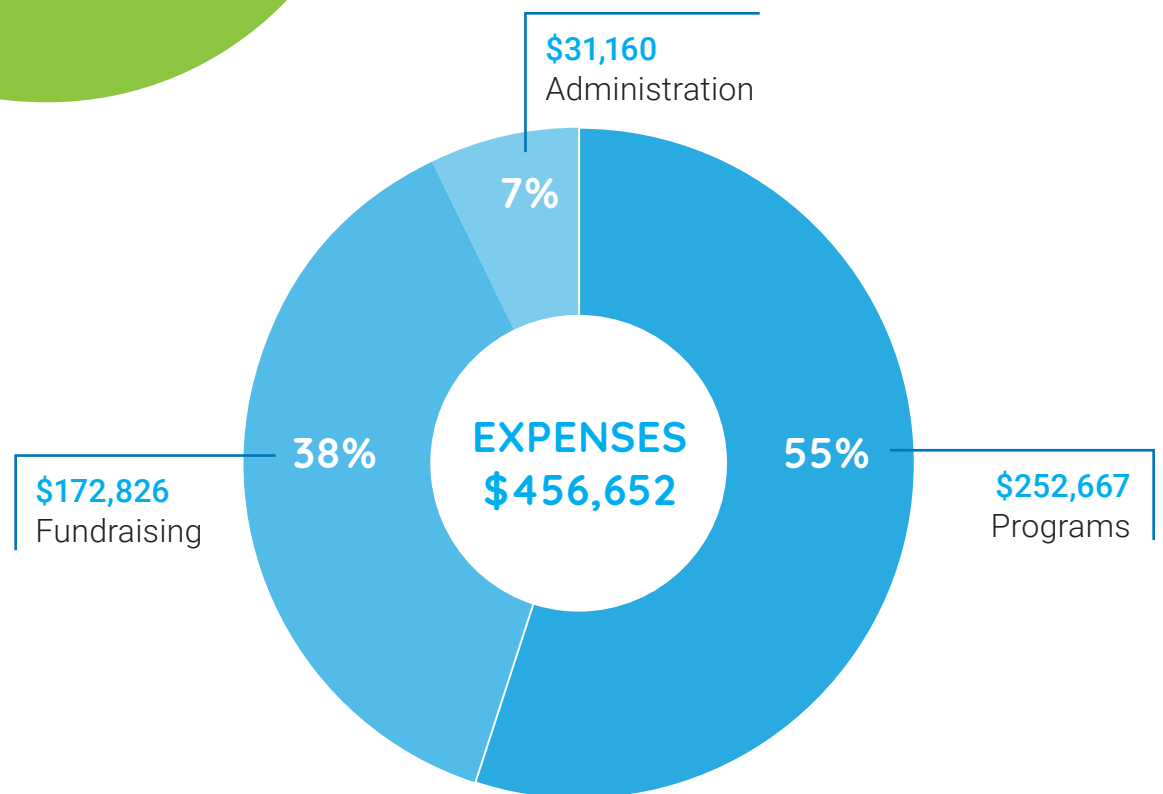
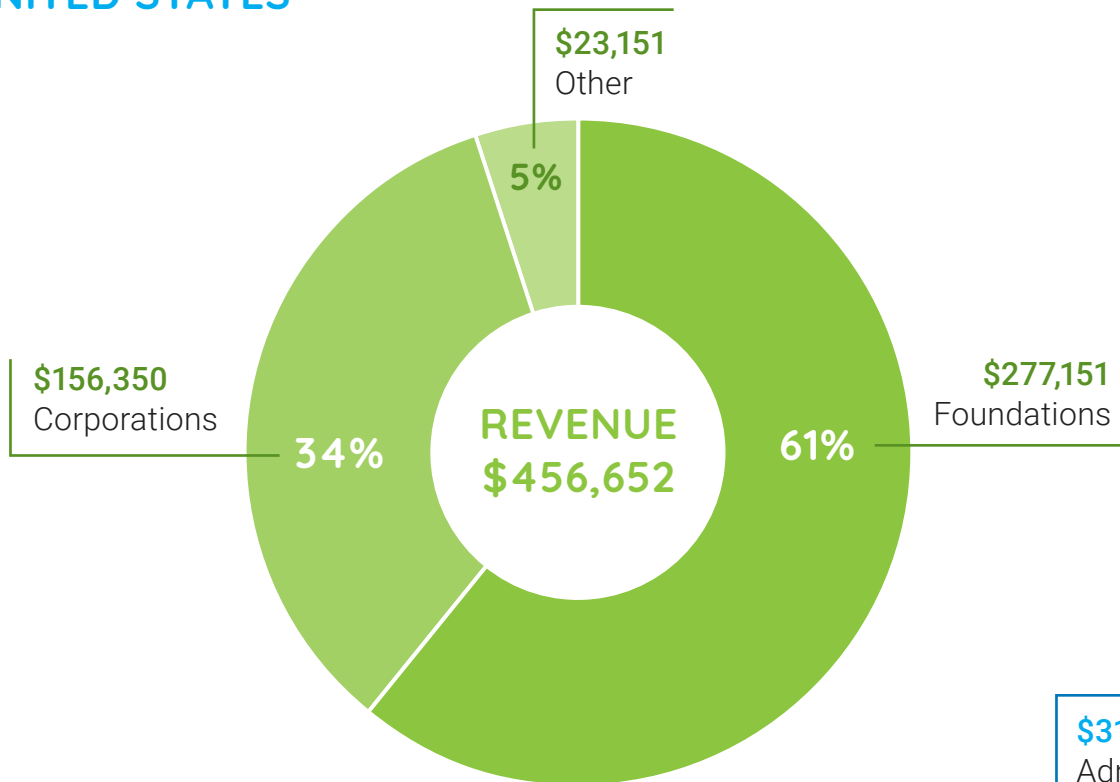
